

Archbishop of Canterbury Comes Home

Lambeth Palace has today released details of a visit by the Archbishop of Canterbury to Coventry and Warwickshire in May. The Most Reverend Justin Welby will be meeting people throughout the city and county which profoundly shaped his mission and ministry for fifteen years.

Having been ordained in Coventry Cathedral in 1992, Justin Welby was a curate in Nuneaton and then a rector in Southam. He later served at Coventry Cathedral from 2002 to 2007, where he became the Canon for Reconciliation Ministry. A decade later is frequently seen wearing the Coventry Cross of Nails.

Archbishop Justin is returning home to help celebrate the Centenary of the Diocese of Coventry. The diocese, in its current form, was created in 1918. At the same time, the old parish church of St Michael became the cathedral of the new diocese.

He is returning to Coventry and Warwickshire at the invitation of the Bishop of Coventry, who says:

"It's very exciting to be able to welcome the Archbishop of Canterbury back to the Diocese he knows so well as part of our centenary celebrations. There's much that's new that we're looking forward to showing Archbishop Justin but we also want to celebrate the way that we're trying today what our forebears did in the past — to live out the reconciling, transforming, life-affirming love of God and to share it with all the people of Coventry and Warwickshire."

From 2nd to 5th May, Archbishop Justin will be meeting civic and religious leaders, refugees, asylum seekers, farmers, school children, teachers, students, business leaders, performers in the Arts, hospital patients and staff.

The general public will also have an opportunity to hear and meet the archbishop at three events.

- There will be a hog roast at Grange Farm, Grandborough (between Rugby and Southam) on Thursday 3 May. The event starts at 6:30 pm.
- 'Ask the Archbishop' is an event for people in their 20s and 30s at All Saint's Church, Chilvers Coton (Nuneaton) on Friday 4 May. It starts at 7:30 pm and includes an opportunity for questions from the audience.
- The main highlight of the archbishop's visit will be a **Centenary Festival** at Coventry Cathedral on Saturday 5 May. The festival starts at 10:30 am and includes music, drama and activities for all ages.

Admission to all three events are free of charge, and further information can be found online at cov100.org

Over the last 12 months a sharp decline in rod numbers has led to the overheads far outweighing the income and with no improvement envisaged we have been forced to make this decision.

Cocks Close pool will close on Sunday 8th April and from then on will form part of the carp syndicate currently on Broadwater and Burnet Iron pools.

Current members of the trout fishery will be able to continue trout fishing on Park Meadow pool until May 31st.

ACTION:

1.0 **MEETING - 8TH MAY 2017**

- 1.1 As the Parish Meeting on 8th May 2017 was held after the production of the April 2017 Parish Magazine, it was not possible to include the Minutes within that publication and, therefore, the Minutes of the meeting were circulated to those that requested a copy. There being no comments, the Minutes were approved and signed by Lord Aylesford as a true copy.
- 1.2 Matters Arising are covered in the body of these minutes.

2.0 **CHURCH MATTERS**

Church matters were summarised by Lord Aylesford and are separately covered in the minutes of the Church meeting.

3.0 NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH/SECURITY

- 3.1 There was no Police presence at the meeting. A summary of a number of minor incidents had been forwarded by Craig Marshall from Warwickshire Police and these were as follows since the start of the year.
- 3.1.1 One vehicle was stolen from a residential property. No details of location.

3.1.2 There were no reported burglaries to businesses or distraction burglaries.

3.2 Anti-social behaviour

3.2.1 One log from the Hotel on 13th February but no further details.

3.3 Robbery

3.3.1 There was an attempted robbery in a layby, probably on the A45, where an individual was struck over the head whilst the robbers tried to take the vehicle, apparently unsuccessfully.

3.4 **Vehicle Crime**

3.4.1 Four reports.

3.5 WhatsApp Group

A Beaty 3.5.1 Adam Beaty offered to set up a WhatsApp group which would provide an early warning system of any events taking place. Those interested in being in the group should provide their details to Adam Beaty whose mobile number is 07775 680099.

4.0 **PROPERTY MARKING EVENT**

NPB 4.1 Lord Aylesford was happy for the Hall to be used in May or June and NPB would write to Craig Marshall suggesting some dates.

5.0 **HS2 UPDATE**

- The majority of the early works contracts are likely to commence early next year. There are a significant number of road schemes which will need to be implemented including:
 - a) The widening of the A452 north of Stonebridge to three lanes in either direction.
 - b) The elevation of the A45 between Stonebridge and the M42 in order to lift it over the line of HS2 which will cut through Top Hat Kennels.
 - c) The alteration to the route of Diddington Lane, also to go over the line of HS2.
 - d) The construction of a viaduct by Patrick Farm, across the flood plain.

- e) Works to Stonebridge roundabout including the widening of it, dedicated filter lanes and the possibility of a lane for southbound traffic coming from the A452 through the centre of the roundabout.
- f) The alteration of the A452 between Cornets End roundabout and Lincoln Farm café to lift the A452 over the railway line which crosses at that point.
- g) Construction of a roundabout at the Marsh Lane/Lincoln Farm café junction followed by another one south of this at the Park Lane junction.

6.0 M42 JUNCTION 6 IMPROVEMENT WORKS

6.1 NPB outlined these and handed round a drawing which shows a proposal to construct a new junction around the Catherine de Barnes Lane crossing of the M42, designed to take northound traffic going to the NEC, Airport and East Birmingham onto the A45 via a new link road. It is hoped that this will alleviate some of the pressure on Junction 6 which will also have some further dedicated slip roads constructed. Catherine de Barnes Lane would be altered and Bickenhill would be linked to that altered road.

7.0 M6 JUNCTION 2 TO JUNCTION 4 - SMART MOTORWAY

7.1 Works to construct this are likely to start shortly.

8.0 **A452 BY DIDDINGTON HALL**

Works to protect the A452, by Diddington Hall, from undermining by the River Blythe have been postponed but it is hoped that they will be undertaken later this year. There will be an alteration of traffic for probably a two week period so that the northbound carriageway becomes two way.

9.0 FILLONGLEY ROAD BRIDGE

The closure of this bridge, to allow resurfacing and strengthening, is also due this year but has been postponed due to funding.

10. **ANY OTHER BUSINESS**

10.1 Litter

NPB

This continues to be an issue particularly along Shepherds Lane and around the Little Chef. NPB confirmed that there had been a number of complaints made to Environmental Health which, on the recommendation of Margaret le FoL, will be linked to the presence of rats.

NPB remarked that there is a planning application in for the demolition of the old Little Chef and the creation of a tile warehouse. There was a request from the Beatys for the topless burger bar to be returned!

10.2 A45 Death

There was no clear news on the recent death on the A45 which appeared to result from somebody falling off the bridge.

Welcome

Welcome to the first HS₂ Look Ahead for the Interchange Station in Solihull.

In early 2018, we began works in and around the new HS2 Interchange Station site which is located within the A452, A45 and M42 triangle (see map on page two). This newsletter will bring you all you need to know about what works are taking place to deliver the station, including the road upgrades in the surrounding area.

The purpose of this quarterly newsletter is to:

- Update you about the works taking place in your area;
- Inform you of our engagement with local communities and businesses; and
- Engage you on the development of the designs for the new station.

- A high-level construction programme;
- Information about the early works starting in your area;
- Details of the upgrades to roads and junctions starting later in 2018;
- Information on our community and business engagement; and
- A chance to apply for funding for your local community projects.

The journey starts here

The Interchange Station will be a catalyst for growth in an already thriving economic area of the West Midlands. Its location in Solihull, opposite the M₄₂, will provide a gateway to Birmingham Airport, the NEC and Birmingham International Station, which it will be seamlessly connected to via a people mover.

The station will provide access to and from London and Manchester in under 40 minutes, making it one of

the most well connected areas in the country.

As part of HS2 Phase One, which runs from London Euston to Birmingham Curzon Street and up to Handsacre in Staffordshire, the Interchange Station will be open in 2026.

Between now and 2026 there is a lot of work to do to get the station open and the trains rolling, and we want to make sure we take you on that journey with us.



In February this year, HS2 appointed Arup as its Station Design Consultant for the Interchange Station. Arup will be working in conjunction with a team of architectural, planning and construction consultants including RLB, CBRE and Churchman Landscape Architects, supported by Glenn Howells, Wilkinson Eyre Architects, Costain and GWP. This followed the appointment of the Main Work Civils Contractor, Balfour Beatty Vinci (BBV) in summer 2017 and Laing O'Rourke and J. Murphy & Sons Joint Venture (LM) as the Enabling Works Contractor in 2016.

Building HS2: The journey to 2026

The image below sets out the construction journey for the Interchange Station and the associated works required to deliver it.

2016 Full HS2 route confirmed

2017 Phase One of HS2, between London and Birmingham, approved by Parliament

2018 Enabling works for HS2 and Interchange Station design begins

2020 The main phase of construction work begins

2026 The HS2 route and Interchange Station opens to the public

Preparing the route

The first phase of HS2 works, known as the Enabling Works, is being carried out by the Laing O'Rourke and J. Murphy & Sons Joint Venture (LM). The work will involve preparing the Interchange site for construction, diverting utilities, and upgrading roads and junctions around the triangle.

The early enabling works are underway and you will likely see HS2 contractors across the area carrying out survey works. These include:

- Topographical surveys which will help us identify and map the existing features on the land required for the Interchange Station. The majority of these works will take place during normal working hours and will have limited impact on your daily activities;
- Ground investigations on the land and on highways, which involve digging trial pits and boreholes to assess the ground and road conditions. The majority of these works will be carried out during both normal and night-time hours. Some night works may involve temporary lane closures. We will ensure that these works are communicated to you before they begin; and
- Ground investigations, which will also inform land contamination reports and allow LM to develop
 a land remediation strategy for the station site.

In the coming weeks, there will be multiple engineering surveys in and around the Interchange Station site. These works will commence on Wednesday 21st March 2018.

Further surveys will start in April. Traffic management will be required to facilitate some of these surveys and this will involve temporary lane closures on the roads listed below. The temporary lane closures will be required for a number of nights during the following dates:

- A452/A446/B4438 Roundabout: 3rd April 21st April 2018
- A452 Northbound & A452 Southbound: 9th April 12th May 2018
- Stonebridge Island (A45 Eastbound & A45 Westbound): 30th April 19th May 2018

Further communications will be issued once more detail on the specific dates and times of these lane closures is scheduled.

Further works around the M42 will be communicated in due course. Also in the next few months, we will be setting up our construction compounds. Initial work will involve removing existing vegetation from the sites and levelling the ground. LM will be occupying the compounds from July 2018.

Road upgrades and utility diversions

Starting in summer 2018, works will begin to divert a number of utilities that cross the Interchange Triangle. These include overhead electricity power lines and underground utility mains.


Starting autumn 2018, LM will begin works to upgrade roads and junctions in three areas across the site.

The three main area of works will be:

- Upgrades to the existing A₄₅₂ and B₄₄₃8 roundabouts, close to the NEC and Birmingham Business Park;
- Construction of new A₄₅₂/A₄₄6 roundabout as an entrance and exit to the Interchange Station;
 and
- Widening the A452 Chester Road north of Stonebridge Island.

Designs for each of these upgrades are currently being developed in dialogue with key stakeholders. The next edition of this newsletter will feature full details of these works.
