HARVEST IS A TIME FOR THANKSGIVING

<u>The Harvest Sermon at St James Great Packington, October 2021'</u>
<u>Rev John Bradford</u>

"Thou visitest the earth and blessest it: thou maketh it very plenteous" (Ps 65.9)

I - The way we have 'undertaken' Harvest over more than a century has been changing:

Our thankful thoughts about Harvest 150 years ago in Victorian times and earlier appear slower but essentially happy, confident and communal ~ with villagers and others coming to help.

Our thankful thoughts 100 years ago, following the first World War, would have been quieter, and even slightly solemn as local young colleagues killed or injured were remembered, the horses recruited which did not return, and with post-War social circumstances difficult.

Our thankful thoughts about Harvest 50 years ago were more farming-family operations, relatively newly-mechanised and, for outsiders, even sentimental.

Our thankful thoughts about Harvest today are much more 'farm-isolated', mechanically highly-advanced, some larger-scale & rather more type-specialised.

Our thankful thoughts about Harvest today have also become more consciously 'inclusive' ~ bearing in mind not only the 8bn mouths to feed worldwide, but the Harvest products grown and supplied to us from farmers overseas.

II - The way we think about Harvest to-day has been changing

We have growing awareness now of the inevitability of deleterious climate-change and of its Harvest implications for farmers and gardeners ~ as those gathering for COP26 next month will be doing.

We all have a growing awareness of the severity of the destructiveness caused by heat, drought, fire and flood affecting farmers (fishermen, gardeners and others) their work and their Harvests world-wide.

We have growing awareness of some farming development 'absurdities' as they may seem to-day: namely, 'vertical farming' (manned by robots) and genetic editing ~ and even the hint of Artificial Intelligence.

With the Duke of Cambridge, we have seen a growing awareness of the disparity between interest in space tourism rather than a conservationist and protective approach to earth.

We have growing awareness of the uncertainties as to how future farming and harvesting patterns in our own particular situations may go forward ~ and for the longer-term implications of this.

III - The way we approach Harvest Spirituality today needs to be changed by being deepened not weakened

(a) Deepening Harvest Spiritually 'on the ground'

By encouraging farmers and gardeners generally who value soil & seed, livestock & fisheries, sunshine and showers

By encouraging students and lecturers in Agricultural Colleges with their desire for best practice and constructive farming progress

By encouraging a growing spirit of community appreciation of, and concern for, our local farms and farmers

(b) Deepening Harvest Spiritually in our hearts

For the beneficent stability, trust and understanding of our Creator God: we must keep giving thanks

For a spirit of optimism and pride in all our agricultural work and gardening enterprise: we must keep giving thanks

For the prayers of the faithful "Give us this day our daily bread": we must keep giving thanks

As the Psalmist said: "Thou crownest the year with thy goodness" (Ps 65.12)

Let us be sure to offer Him our Harvest thanks and praise.

REV JOHN BRADFORD - 60TH ANNIVERSARY OF ORDINATION

On Sunday 3rd October it was with great pleasure that we presented Rev John Bradford with a painting of St James' Church to mark the 6oth year of his ordination, which he had celebrated just two days before. A remarkable accomplishment and if you read below you will see the incredible amount that John has achieved since he became a Priest.

For those of you that know him, it goes without saying how very lucky we are to have him as our Honorary Chaplain here at St James. He is a truly special man who has looked after us for over 20 years and we are so grateful for his continued support. He and Marion are never without a smile and we can't thank you them enough.



REV JOHN BRADFORD - 60TH ANNIVERSARY OF ORDINATION

Fr John Bradford was selected for training for the Ministry at a Selection Board held at Farnham Castle when he was 18. Following National Service with the RAF (attending courses at Dowdeswell Court, the RAF Chaplain's School) and based in Somerset, he undertook some temporary teaching before Theological College and graduation in Theology, Ethics and Philosophy (London University).


Made Deacon in 1960 at Wells Cathedral to serve in the parish of Walcot St Swithin, Bath (a parish which includes the architecturally famous Royal Crescent and Circus), he was ordained Priest at the parish church of St Mary, Bridgwater, on 1st October 1961 - sixty years ago. At Bath, with his fellow curate leaving to teach the children of the Imperial Family in Ethiopia, and with the indisposition of the Rector, he served in charge for almost two of nearly four years, seeing the opening of the Snow Hill Centre and the laying of the foundation stone of the new St Andrew's Church. He acted as Chaplain to the Diocesan Secondary School and to Ladymead House (a residential home for adults with learning difficulties), and took one service each week at Bath Abbey.

After being on the staff of the Church of England JI School at Wendover in Buckinghamshire in order to obtain qualified teacher status, John became Head of Religious Education at Dr Challoner's High School, Little Chalfont, a member of the Farmington Trust Moral Education Project and lecturer in Comparative Religion for the University of Oxford Extra-Mural Department and the W.E.A. During this period he ministered at the parishes of St James, Fulmer, at Cheddington and Mentmore, and at Wendover, St Anne.

After advanced study in the sociology of education at the Department of Educational Studies of the University of Oxford, he joined the staff of St Peter's Church of England Teacher-Training College at Saltley, Birmingham, in 1970, lecturing in Religious and Social Studies and becoming Chairman of the Academic Council. In 1972 John was part of a Government multi-professional study team visiting schools in Jamaica, and later served as a part-time lecturer, examiner and consultant of the Open University in Urban Education. He was a member of a British Council of Churches delegation to the EEC following the Lime Convention. With his wife, Marion, John has lived and given honorary assistance in the parish of St Alphege, Solihull to five incumbents since that time. They have three children - Jane, Martyn and Claire.

With the closure of St Peter's College, Saltley, in 1977, John became the first national Chaplain Missioner of *The Children's Society*, being a licensed public preacher of the Diocese of Birmingham and having general permission to officiate in the Church of Wales. During these 22 years of London-based ministry to some 130 projects and 1200 staff, and with a Chapel of the Good Shepherd first at Alveston and then at Blackwell, John wrote papers and reports on ethical issues (e.g. to the Warnock Commission), organised retreats, devised services for the Royal Albert Hall, the Central Hall, and for Cathedrals and parishes across England and Wales. He took a Master's degree in Education of the University of Birmingham, and was a national chairman of the *Children's Rights and Responsibilities Committee* of the UN International Year of the Child, 1979.

Having trained at the Churches' Television Centre at Bushey, he took part in radio and television (e.g. *Night Thoughts* with Tyne-Tees Television). He was a link-person with the *International Catholic Child Bureau* at Geneva, co-organiser of the annual *Summer School for Social Workers* at Swanwick, a former chairman of the *Anglican Voluntary Societies'* Forum of the General Synod, a Bishops' Inspector of Theological Colleges, and a founder member of the Brussels-based *Eurodiaconia* (the care and social responsibility forum of the Lutheran, Reformed and Orthodox Churches in Europe).



John was vice-chairman of *Family Forum* and of the *Family Policy Studies Centre*, an Anglican representative for the inauguration of the Tokyo-based interfaith Global Network of Religions for Children and member of the management committee of the International Family Network of the Anglican Consultative Council and contributor to its Newsletters.

Author of a number of books, papers (e.g. *The Spiritual Rights of the Child*), prayers and articles, he has made presentations or contributions for *The Children's Society* to a range of international ecumenical conferences on child, family and pastoral issues in New York (Cardinal Spellman Centre), Chicago, Berlin, Copenhagen, Scotland (University of Stirling), UNESCO Paris, Rome, Warsaw, Hungary, Crete, the University of Beer-Sheva, Tokyo, Hiroshima, etc. He spent a short sabbatical in 1985 at the World Council of Churches in Geneva under Dr Hans-Reudi Weber. John's ministry looked outwards and engaged with change.

John celebrated his retirement Eucharist on Tuesday 23rd March 1999 at the Parish Church of Our Holy Redeemer, Exmouth Market, Clerkenwell, with the choir of St Clement Danes, and at which the preacher was the late Rt. Rev'd. Jim Thompson, chairman of *The Children's Society,* and Bishop of Bath and Wells.

More locally, John served on the Bishop's Council, represented the Diocese of Birmingham on the Education Committee of the Metropolitan Borough of Solihull for 19 years, has served as Mayor's Chaplain, has been governor of seven Local Authority Schools north and south of the Metropolitan Borough, and of Saint Martin's Independent School, was founder Chairman of the all-party Solihull Branch of the *European Movement*, and is a Trustee of the 'Make a better life' (MABL) Solihull domestic violence charity. He has co-led at least twelve parish pilgrimages to Israel and in the steps of St Paul.

In addition to regular assistance given at St Alphege, Solihull, since 1970, and to assisting in the Deanery, John has served as Honorary Chaplain at the Estate Chapel of St James, here at Packington from 2000, and as Honorary Chaplain to the Solihull Branch of the Royal British Legion.

NEW STAFF



FROM ANIMAL HUSBANDRY TO LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE!

The deer, lechwe and mouflon have all been relatively well behaved that last few months so we have temporarily moved on from recreating Longleat to recreating the Great Wall of China..!

I wish I could pass all the blame onto Jay and his metal detector for the rather large hole that we've started to dig in front of the Hall but I'm not sure I'd get away with it. What might appear as an apocalypse-ready fortification, is in fact a ha-ha... Surprisingly not designed to keep out zombies but actually to keep all those well-behaved deer away from the front of the Hall without blocking the view of the Park. Let's hope that when it's all finished we don't fine one of our hoofed friends perched on top!

Originally a feature of formal French gardens of the early eighteenth century, and then used by British landscape architects such as Capability Brown (who designed the Pleasure Grounds and a lot of the Park), the ha-ha derived its name from the success of the optical illusion it created from a distance on viewers of the garden: the concealed ditch and wall would supposedly surprise those coming near it, and make them cry, "Ah! Ah!"





Not content with carving up the parkland, some of you may also have seen a large soup bowl, or more appropriately, a small swimming pool outside the front of the Hall as well.

This is in fact the Walled Garden's new water feature. The idea is that it will look like it's floating on top of a pool which the water will drop into. It needs to be as level as possible for this to work so cross fingers! It's currently being tested (demonstrated in the photo by Lindsay!) and will hopefully be installed into its new home in the New Year.

The Dahlias have once again been show stoppers this year but they have now finally gone black and we are starting to lift them and swap them over for the tulip bulbs.

With it being our first year in putting on this event and working in a location that had never been used in this way before, we have learnt a huge amount! However we are looking forward to tweaking and improving wherever we can to make it even better next year.

A enormous thank you must go to John Burchell and the rest of the fisheries team for not only putting up with the invasion (zombie and otherwise!) but also for all their help leading up to and during the event. We hope that Salazar the Swamp Serpent didn't scare away too many fish!



REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE

Recently I have been reading (which is very unusual for me!) a lot about how we can turn our farms around and look at them from a more holistic point of view in terms of soil health and nature as well as production, and consequently profit. There are people that I have read about around the world that are making really good money from their farms just by changing the methods and processes and this has started a very exciting journey into the Regenerative Agriculture movement.

Rightly or wrongly, we are doing it to the extreme! What I want to achieve is to be a case study/laughing stock for all the farmers around Packington. I am keen for the farming community to come and see what it is we are doing or not doing. Gone are the days of high input farming. What we are trying to work out is how we can work with nature and not against it. We predict 2-5 years of not great results but over time, as the soil structure recovers and we reduce overhead costs, we hope we will be able to show a better return than present, as well as healthier and happier soil.

We will keep you updated with what we are up too during future issues of the Parish Mag. Sam White, our land agent is going to dive into a little more detail on exactly what it is we are doing below. Over to you Sam...



The Estate farms over 400 acres of land in-hand and over the past 12 months we have altered how this land is farmed and have commenced using practices that fall within the bracket of regenerative agriculture.

The concept of regenerative agriculture goes beyond sustainability and actively looks to improve soil conditions. The practices adopted aim to minimise soil disturbance, maximise crop diversity, and keep a cover over the soil and will help build soil structure and return nutrients to the ground.

We are no longer using chemical sprays or fertilisers and to minimise soil disturbance we are also utilising minimum tillage planting techniques.

We have changed our farming rotation to incorporate cover crops and this year we have planted over 90 acres of a diverse cover crop seed mixture that incorporates 8 different plant varieties, this will assist in building soil structure and the anticipation is that next year we will look to plant a cereal crop, probably wheat directly into the mixture.

We have also planted 20 acres of spelt seed (a heritage grain variety), this has been planted directly into an existing clover crop and we are looking forward to seeing the spelt grow through the clover.

Prior to venturing into regenerative agriculture, we took soil samples and had them analysed and these will now act as a marker as to the improvements that changing our farming practices have had on the land. Regenerative agriculture principles promote integrating livestock into the rotation and so we have recently engaged with advisors who are helping us to form a plan that may eventually see cattle being brought onto the land!



An important request from Emily Williams, community fundraiser at Marie Curie:

We also provide care through our Information and Support Services. Our Information and Support Services have enabled even more people to get the information and support that they need. Whether it be by calling our bereavement and support line, or using our online chat service, using our website to find out information about a range of different topics or ordering our free booklets that also offer information and support on a number of different topics.

Our Information and Support Services aren't just there for people receiving care by our nurses or in our hospices, they are available to everyone, which means we are supporting a huge amount of people. And this is only growing. COVID-19 and the restrictions in place have meant people have had so many precious moments with their loved ones, at the end of their lives, taken from them. Many people haven't even had the chance to say goodbye or to grieve. This will affect people for years to come. Bur our Information and Support Services will be here to help people.

On top of our services being needed now more than ever, and our nurses facing new challenges, most of our fundraising has come to a stop. Normally we would be gearing up for our Great Daffodil Appeal. This year is our 35th year. We would normally be contacting hundreds of supermarkets and high street stores to book in bucket collections. We would be booking thousands of volunteers onto those collections. And we would be handing out hundreds of thousands of our iconic daffodils to people who have very kindly made a donation to Marie Curie.

However, this year we cannot do this. We have had to come up with different ways of fundraising, such as hosting Virtual Collections, encouraging people to Step Into Spring and be sponsored for walking 10,000 step every day in March and launching our Two Hour Challenge. However, we still need to do more. We have to be upfront and ask people to donate to Marie Curie. We need people to donate. We need people to fund raise and raise money for Marie Curie, so we can continue to deliver our expert end of life care.
